

## **Policy Extract**

## Promoting and Protecting Human Rights

Pinarc recognises all people with disability have human and legal rights which should be respected at all times. Pinarc promotes and protects those rights as an integral component of each and all of its services. This policy ensures the rights of people with disability are upheld during the planning and provision of services.

## **Policy Statement**

- All people have the right to be respected for their human worth and dignity.
- People with disability have the rights of freedom of expression, self-determination and decision making.
- Pinarc actively prevents abuse, harm, neglect and violence.
- People with disability have the same right as other people to be able to determine their own best interests, and make decisions that will affect their lives.
- People with disability have the right as other people to realise their potential for physical, social, emotional and intellectual development.
- People with disability have the right to full participation in society equal to other people, according to their individual and cultural needs and preferences.
- Pinarc is committed to providing each individual using a service with information and support to understand and exercise their legal and human rights.
- All people have the right to privacy of their personal information.
- Pinarc employs skilled staff and has systems and processes in place to support staff to promote and protect human rights.
- People with disability have the same right as other people to raise concerns and be supported to formalise complaints.
- People with disability have access to support when abuse or harm occurs.
- Pinarc will take all allegations of abuse, harm and neglect seriously and respond according to best practice.

## **Definition**

Human rights are often defined in different ways. The Australian Human Rights Commission defines human rights as:

- the recognition and respect of people's dignity
- a set of moral and legal guidelines that promote and protect a recognition of our values, our identity and ability to ensure an adequate standard of living
- the basic standards by which we can identify and measure inequality and fairness
- those rights associated with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

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
